Mimicking a storyboard using Powerpoint

For our purposes, Powerpoint can mimic storyboarding easily:

- 1. Insert images/ideas onto pages as you wish. No need to painstakingly arrange images at this time, unless you intend on using each page as an image in your video.
- 2. Consider each page as a "frame" of your future video, with each frame occupying about 10-30 seconds of time on the screen. For example:
 - a. 2019 Dust Bowl video: 11 min., 7 sec. long (667 seconds), 40 frames = 16.5 sec./frame
 - b. 2021 Forest Carbon video: 5 min., 10 sec. long (310 seconds), 10 frames = 31 sec./frame
 - c. 2020 Prescott video: 12 min., 49 sec. long (769 seconds), 24 frames = 32 sec./frame
- 3. Move pages around as you wish, freely changing your mind as you go.
- 4. In the notes section for each page, add text that will be the exact spoken narration for your video. Increase the font size to about/at least 16. Insert names of each reader and spaces in between readers.
- 5. Share with collaborators to ensure everyone agrees with what will be presented and said in the video.
- 6. Print the final version as "notes pages," either to hardcopy or PDF, as desired.
- 7. Use as the script for reading for the voiceover.
